

Our Moonlight & Magnolias Tour- a delightful time....

At the end of August, leading into Labor Day weekend, a group of 21 intrepid travelers made the trip south to the beautiful town of Thomasville, Ga. The journey passed by smoothly, and was broken up with a couple of fun stops. Lunch on Thursday was at Ms. Betty's Fried Chicken in Butler, where the chicken is superb! The BLT was also popular, and contained a tasty twist on the classic: battered and deep-fried bacon. Reports were

very positive.

1From there we continued down the road (encountering a little rain...) until we arrived in Radium Springs Gardens in Albany. The Gardens is a unique venue that once boasted a hotel, casino, and golf course, plus the lure of the special waters, first discovered by the native Indian tribes. Nestled around the headwaters of the Flint River, the water in the pond that is pumped from underground caves is crystal clear, and is surrounded by terraced gardens. The water from the caves is consistently 68 degrees and is the perfect environment for some endangered river creatures. It is definitely worth a stop if you should find yourself in the vicinity.








The time spent in Thomasville was highlighted by a visit to the really outstanding History Museum housed in a period home. The collection of items, and the stories that they tell are so varied, interesting, poignant, and fascinating. An outstanding gem.

The companion museum, the Lapham-Patterson home, has an intriguing history. Built in 1884-85, each room has multiple windows and doors for easy exit, as Mr. Lapham was terrified of fire. There are very few square walls, considered more "natural," and the house had central gas for lighting. The home also had running hot and cold water, adding to its reputation as a technological marvel.

Cairo, GA, was our next stop, where we had a great buffet lunch hosted by Mr. Chick, Wayne Hadden, inside his remarkable museum. Mr. Hadden has been a vintage car enthusiast for decades, and a collector of cars as well as lots of related memorabilia. As the first Fire Chief of the all-volunteer force, he grew it from a handful of people to some two-hundred. Naturally, some of his collection includes fire engines and other items from that career that is clearly another passion. Among many accomplishments, Wayne spearheaded a fundraising drive to help



families of New York firefighters who perished in the twin towers on 9/11. The effort raised substantial funds that were given directly to the families, and every year Cairo has a "Step Climb" in remembrance of that event.







Our next stop was just down the road at the beautiful home of Ed and Pam Prince, also long-time car enthusiasts, whom we met through Jack & Drena Miller. The Princes are very active in the hobby, with their emphasis being on touring in any one of their many intriguing cars. The sprawling property was picturesque and relaxing. And we gazed from afar at the tranquil pond, know there is a resident alligator there!

Saturday morning we ventured to Pebble Hill Plantation, listed in the Register of National Historic Places. Its history goes back to the early 1800s when it was a working farm, and then it became a destination as a shooting plantation, catering to northerners escaping harsh winters. Many of those wealthy families, charmed by the area, bought properties and built homes, adding greatly to the local economy, and helping to shape the environment with prosperity and sophistication. The last owner of Pebble Hill, "Pansy" Poe, was a great benefactor for Thomasville, and desired to have the home open to the public after her death. That dream was realized in 1983. We were not allowed to take photos in the home, but suffice to say it is at once grand and intimate, tasteful, colorful, and full of life. The gardens, grounds and out building combine to make this a spectacular, historical showplace.





For our farewell dinner we enjoyed a nice meal at the 1861 Distillery in Thomasville, where some of us took an informative tour of the distillery itself. The owner, Brian Higgins, showed us his operation where he and his staff concoct a variety of spirits in small batches, which are used as ingredients for drinks at the bar, for tastings, and for sale onsite. It may be a compact space, but it houses all the necessary equipment for the distilling, aging and bottling their products. It was a very nice evening wrapping up a most enjoyable tour.



The Tech Corner

A Poor Man's Posi traction

Every once in a while I disassemble a Model A rear axle assembly and find that someone has welded the three spider gears in the differential to their axle shafts so that they do not rotate. I envision some 17 year old kid with a duck-tail haircut back in 1950 doing this. In the day this was called a poor man's Posi traction. By welding the spider gears so that they do not rotate, there is essentially no differential gearing in the rear axle assembly. This allows Mr. Ducktail to take off from a signal and lay down a strip of rubber equally from both back wheels. The differential gearing in a rear axle assembly was developed by some ingenious mind. It allows a car to turn a corner with each rear wheel turning at a different rotation. The outboard wheel is turning faster than the inboard wheel. This allows the car to make a turn in either direction in a smooth continuous manner. Mr. Ducktail when making a turn would have his out board wheel skipping and making a chirping sound as the rubber tire skidded around the turn.

It is interesting to note that the rear axle assembly that the spider gear assembly came out of in the photo below also had a tooth missing from the ring gear.

FASHION FINDS...

It's always interesting to look back at daily like in the Model A Era, and that sometimes includes the rather mundane aspects. Laundry is a necessity that's pretty easily handled these days, but let's see what our Model A sisters experienced in what will be a 3-part article.

Laundry In the Model A Era

In our car club we talk about the cars and we talk about era clothing, but we do not talk about cleaning our clothing. I have a book written in 1931 about laundering and dry cleaning. The book was published by the Woman's Institute of Domestic Arts and Sciences. After reading this book, I see that laundry is laundry. We still have to sort, wash, dry, iron and fold our clothes. However, during the Model A era, it was a lot of work. The process took the better part of two days and could be downright dangerous. They did not have the conveniences that we have today.

When Is Wash Day?

A famous poem says that Monday is laundry day. The book says that Tuesday was becoming more popular. Monday was the day to prepare for the washday: put the house in order, remove stains, mend and sort the clothes.

Setting Up the Laundry - The Equipment

In most homes the laundry was done in the kitchen or in an adjoining room. Sometimes the laundry was in the basement. No matter which room was used, it needed to be well ventilated, well lit and have access to hot water.

Washing Machines and Tubs

There were several types of washing machines. Basically they were washing tubs with a lid and a device inside to agitate the clothing. They could be cranked by hand or have a motor powered by electricity, gas or water. The 1931 Sears catalog advertised an electric washer for \$50.00 to \$65.00 and a gasoline one for \$89.50. A hand activated machine sold for \$16.00. To put this in perspective, the Model A era was during the Great Depression, when the average annual income was \$1850.00. That is about \$36.00 a week. I suspect that most homes used the hand cranked model. The wash tub with a wash board was still available, as well as a hand held suction plunger or agitator.

The washing machine tubs needed to be cleaned by hand with soap and water. If the tub was copper, a mixture of vinegar, salt and kerosene was used. In our modern era we use a tub cleaning agent and the washer cleans itself.

**Next month we'll hear about soap, the actual washing, and then the drying techniques of the day.






