The Traveling Tool Chest - Wrap-up

Those of us who tour, normally carry some parts, and maybe those we tour with will have what we don't have! Each of us should have certain parts: points, condenser, plugs, oil, water, fan belt, spare tire; you know, the things we think we might need!

Last month we were going over the parts that Ray & Teri took with them on their trip to Alaska! Would they need all those parts? I'm sure you are aware of Murphy and his law. What's in motion tends to stay in motion.

NO! that's not right, that Einstein's Law. But that **is** Murphy's Law, is it not? What can go wrong will go wrong! Right? Sooo, if you take all those parts you won't need any; well, NO! It sure was good to have them on their trip.

Now if you followed their Blog, as I did, you know both Ray & Jim had some problems. So let's pick up where we left off on last month's article.

- Jim had a vibration and found the fan belt had separated. He had one, replaced it, and was back on the road in a few minutes.
- Ray started out, after a stop, and the left front dropped 2-3 inches, like he caught a strong cross wind. About 30 miles down the road he decided to check the left front, due to a noise similar to a brake shoe against the drum. Found the wheel-hub very hot, pulled the wheel and about 1 inch of the hub was Burnt White! He took the nut & washer off but could not get the hub off. The outer wheel bearing had broken and the inner race seized (just for information, the race must come off with the rollers; they come as an assembly; check Mike's catalogue, Item# A1216.). Ray was able to break off a piece of the inner race, and then fish out each of the rollers (the cage was

almost gone) and then got the hub off. However, that race was 'welded' to the spindle. An acquaintance they had met earlier, saw them on the side of the road, and stopped to see if he could help. He had a battery drill, so they drilled 5 holes in the race and finally were able to get the <u>pieces</u> off the spindle. They had to hand file the spindle for the new bearing to slide on. They greased the bearing, reassembled and were back on the road.

- Ray adjusted the points, OK! But then they shorted to ground. He had to adjust the clearance between the tail of the modern points and the distributor body. As some of you may know, on modern points this can be a problem and normally we file them down before installing them.
- Just short of North Pole, AK both men changed their oil at about 5,000 miles.
- Ray's water pump was starting to squeak, so he greased it, but then he had to replace it. He had one in his car.
- Jim noticed he was getting a knock, checked it out and found the knock in the front main engine bearing. He thought they might remove some shims but the Babbitt was too far gone. Had to replace the motor; yes, he had a Short Block in the trunk. Waited for an engine lift and pulled the motor in a gravel parking lot! Got it all back together, in spite of the rain; only lost a day. The only oil they had was synthetic, not the best for a break in. Jim had all the parts, and back on the road.
- Next, Jim had a flat. No big deal, right? Well if you saw the pictures, they were loaded (their cars were loaded) so how do you get the spare

off! The lug wrench/crank handle won't work with a trunk. Either take the trunk off --- OR use a short extension and Ratchet! Then you need to lift the spare <u>UP</u> to clear the studs (not very easy for some of our older touring members). Let's think ahead!! OK! Jim had a Model 'A' Jack, great, but it would not work. Ray had a Bottle Jack; worked great. Replaced wheel & tire, and back on the road!

- With all the excitement, and scenery --- Jim blew a head gasket; he forgot to retorque the head! Ray had one, replaced it, and back on the road; then retorqued 2-3 times!
- Ray had a rattle, rear tail pipe clamp, repaired later when they stopped.
- Ray noticed grease at the right front hub cap, checked and replaced outer bearing; greased both and back on the road.
- Jim replaced two front tires that needed replacing badly!
- Jim had to replace a fan belt, Ray had a spare.
- Both almost ran out of gas, but when they finally found gas, Jim had 2/10th of a gallon, Ray had 2 to 2 ½ gallons left.

- Ray changed his oil, for the 2nd time, at his son's house, in Denver.
- Several times, both cars ran rough; it seemed to be the gas or water, or sometimes it was a hole-in-the-wall where they <u>HAD</u> to buy gas; soooo, the old idea of Marvel Mystery Oil does work. As Ray said, a splash of Mystery Oil and most of the time it helped.
- Had to replace another fan belt; could it be the quality? Who knows? They tried a couple of NAPA stores, didn't have the right size, one too long, one too short. But they figured it out. They're home, aren't they?
- Oh yeah, Jim's gas gauge took the deep six or to the bottom of the tank. Just like we would do, we'd guess by using Ray's car's gas gauge.

Total trip, 11,600 miles, 44 days. What scenery, what sights. Can you imagine the Arctic Circle in your 'A?' I sure wish I could have gone, don't you?

he escaped a speeding ticket in his Woody by using coy and devious means (no doubt a colorful story about being a sign painter for the police department).



Model "A" Fashions

Garters are the topic for this month's article. It seems that there were garters for men, women, and children. Babies even wore diaper garters.



They were adjustable to size and were equipped with a special tab and safety pin for attaching. Diaper garters relieved the baby of the discomfort of having the stockings pinned directly to the vest and provided a greater freedom of the legs.



Children had an array of different styles of garters or stocking supporters. There were shoulder styles, waist styles, and pin-on styles. Shoulder styles were made of non-elastic webbing with adjustable straps and garters. Some garter waists came with chest vests or chest bands with adjustable shoulder straps for more support. The pin-on style of hose supporters were made of wide lisle elastic webbing with adjustable garters which

would give freely to the movements of the body.



There was little difference, if any, between boy's and men's garters. The hook-on garters were wide Rayon covered elastic used to hold up knee length athletic socks as those shown.



Women's round garters came in two basic styles; the adjustable fancy rayon covered elastic with colored metal hooks and fittings, and the shirred satin ribbon garters with flower trim in pink, turquoise blue, orchid, and light blue.

Round garter material was also available and sold by the yard for the home seamstress.

North to Alaska: ARE YOU NUTS OR WHAT?

When we were first approached about taking a trip to Alaska, Teri and I were almost immediately ready to go. Planning took 2½ years and, unfortunately, Don & Sandra Mims, the originators of the plan, were unable to go with us due to personal/family issues. Including them would have made the trip even better! The plan started with six A's and ended up with just two. Looking back I feel that was a perfect number. Jim and Rose Donaldson were a perfect pair as traveling companions.

First, we had to make a financial plan; our seed pot was stuffed with \$14,000.00, hoping that would be enough. Fortunately, fuel prices leveled off early in 2011. Additional purchases were required: six tires, a complete engine service, bearing check, valve adjustment, etc.; new brakes all around, including new rear cast iron hubs to cross those Rockies; all fluids had to be changed, wheel bearings inspected and re-packed. Tighten every bolt you can find, then fine tune and adjust everything. The closer to the trip departure date, the more things you start thinking about. Things like, should I put in that fresh engine I have or go with our engine with almost 20,000 miles on it. Do I have enough replacement parts and tools? How many oil changes should we do? Is synthetic oil the best or stay with what we have used in the past? So many unknowns. What did I forget?

Well, finally, June 1st came and we were on the road. First day, only to Marietta, so we can get an early start the next morning, with Jim and Rose avoiding AM Atlanta traffic. Only about a mile from their house we stopped to top off the tanks. Guess what? My car would not start leaving the station. I had put in a new fuse the night prior because I didn't like the look of the one in the car. Well, I fixed it till I broke it. So I changed the fuse and we were rolling. Not too far out of Atlanta Jim started having trouble with overheating. We added water and continued. Not a good start for such a long trip.

The air temperature was high but we knew we were headed for a cooler northern climate so we didn't care. Our first night on the road was in Paducah, KY. We met up with some Model A'ers in town. They were visiting for a Rod Run starting the next day. Telling them about the adventure we were starting was fun and I think the work "CRAZY" may have entered into the conversation. (FYI, we never made any advance reservations for anything.) The next night we planned to stop in Kansas City, MO. Well there was a NASCAR event, a ball game and major concert. Have you heard the expression "There is no room at the inn?" That forced us to continue on to St. Joseph, MO, totaling nearly 500 miles for that day. It was a long day but not that bad.

The next morning we were on the road again. Then Jim's car again was overheating and boiling over. Apparently the thermostat was stuck. After the fix, the coolant was topped off and we were rolling. We are now in the mid-west and it is much cooler, however, new issues with flooding. Torrential rains flooded many areas. There were volunteers at a civic center filling sand bags because things were getting worse not better.

That night we saw the famous Corn Palace. This was quite interesting. The exterior skin of the building is made of corn, creating murals that are changed every year.


Along our trail we saw so many places like The Badlands, Mt. Rushmore, Deadwood, Devils Tower, Little Big Horn and more.



In Wyoming we stopped for gas and Jim's car wouldn't start. It was determined he needed a battery, which was solved down the road at a NAPA store. Teri thought it was quite interesting that across the street was a sign that said "Jack's Liquor and Adult Day Care." I told her that this is where I want to retire!

On to Montana. The temperatures have dropped into the 40's and we are questioning why we didn't bring warmer clothing. The flooding is getting worse; we are informed that recently the rain fall was up to 12", equal to the annual average. I also have installed the manifold heater and we are now toasty in the "A". Jim had removed his thermostat so his hot water heater isn't putting out much heat. He thought a cardboard block of the radiator would help. Well, as we topped the next mountain he was boiling over again. We are now at 8,000 ft. altitude with light rain and snow for the first time. There was a lot of snow cover on the mountains. It's hard to believe just a few days ago we were worried about the heat.

As we continued, we were in Indian Territory. We stayed on the reservation. They liked the cars and reduced the room rate, but it still was pricey. At dinner that night they treated us to fried bread. It is an Indian delicacy. The next day, we toured Glacier National Park. However, most of the roads are still closed due to snow and ice. The roads to higher elevations should open in July but we still saw many glaciers and remains from the winter avalanche damage. On to Canada.

Just past Calgary, the scenery improved. Let me tell you about Lake Louise - it is beyond description. One of the most beautiful areas you could ever imagine. On to the Ice Field Parkway. We stopped for a break at Num'T'Jam Lodge. There were a couple of tour

busses there; if we charged for the photos taken of us, we could have paid for all the gas consumed to date. It was unbelievable - personal photos with the cars, wanting to see the engines, asking to sit in the cars, etc. If I hadn't started my engine and closed the hood we would have never gotten out of there. The scenery in Jasper and Banff Park was beyond words. Animal sightings included Big Horn Sheep and Elk.

Just by chance at lunch we were informed that the International Chain Saw Carving Competition was taking place. We decided to stop and take a look. What a surprise; teams come from all over the world to compete and their work is unbelievable. Look it up on the net, it is in Chetwynd, BC; the winners are posted with their art. We watched them in action. The road through town is garnished with previous year's winning art. At dinner that night, in Dawson Creek, we were sought out by a member of the Chamber of Commerce and he presented us with a few small gifts. We were treated like local celebrities. It was a fun evening.



Today we crossed our first, of many, iron grate floor bridges. Skinny tires didn't like these bridges. We bobbed back and forth all the way across. Our first exposure to "OUT OF GAS" also was today, they say if you see gas, buy it, and that is true. We were carrying 5 gal. gas cans just in case! In Fort Nelson we stopped at an unexpected museum. It was loaded with local history and too many cars to mention, including T's and A's. The oldest was a 1908 Buick that traveled 160 miles on the Alcan on its 100th Birthday. Everything in the museum was in working order. The gentleman that owns the place took a lot of time showing us around.





Our next day turned out OK but was the longest day of the trip for me. I had a front wheel bearing go bad. The inner race welded itself to the spindle and it took five hours to cut and chisel it off. All ended well and we rolled on. Earlier we saw a sign for fresh cinnamon buns and gas so we stopped. I can personally say this was the best ever cinnamon bun. It covered a large desert plate and had to be eaten with a knife and fork; unbelievably delicious!!!! Also, Santa Ray was spotted, photographed for their entry door and web site. When we were pulling out, the owner came running and presented Santa with a gift, an expensive vest that he had worn just, he thought, for the photos. I cannot explain just how friendly the locals have been on this trip.

Planning Meeting for 2012:


