



Once our visit came to an end, we headed over to Johnny's Pizza to enjoy a good meal and review a nice opportunity to connect with people through our cars.



Dear Southsider,


As we come to the end of 2023, it is time to think about participating in MARC's Mileage Program. If you have your Model A registered in the program, take a look at your odometer reading. If you are close to reaching the next award level (2,000 miles, 5,000 miles and each 5,000 miles interval thereafter) consider taking her out for a drive and earn your next award level. We begin gathering info for our report to MARC each January. Remember to read your odometers and forward the reading to Pat Tyler at pat@patpamtyler.com, calling/texting 706-594-4610 or take a picture with your phone and text it. If your Model A is not registered in this program, consider registering and begin accumulating miles for your first award level (2,000 miles). The Tech Corner

Once again, we are indebted to Tom Endy of the Santa Anita A's for compiling many years' worth of tech articles, which he has graciously made available for sharing with the Model A community.

Rear Brake Drums

The hubs on the rear brake drums of a Model A Ford are found in three different configurations. The Judging Standards are silent concerning which configuration should be installed on a given year/month of production car. The reason is probably because the hubs cannot be seen during judging.

The Ford Service Bulletins describes the three configurations but do not reference specific year/month of installations. See the service bulletin below (page 377 for September 1929, page 147 in the book). The only year/month reference useful to the modern Model A enthusiast is that the grooved design hub only will be supplied after September 1929.

DIFFERENCE IN HUBS

Three different types of hubs have been used with the A-1115-B rear hub and brake drum assembly. See Fig. 766.

The "shoulder shank" design is distinguished by a shoulder located midway on the shank.

The taper shank type is practically the same as the shoulder shank design except that the shank is tapered from the shoulder to the outer end.

The grooved shank design is distinguished by a groove located midway on the shank.

These hubs are all interchangeable. However in so far as stocks permit dealers should use the same design hub on both wheels. In the future only the grooved design hub will be supplied.

The Ford Service Bulletin for Sept. 1929

The machining design on the shoulder shank of the three hubs was intended to allow some type of pulling tool to be attached in order to pull the drum off of the tapered axle shaft.

The Mitchell Overdrive Company makes an excellent tool that can be configured to accommodate all three designs. It is small and compact and is easily carried in the car with other common hand tools.



A Backward Interest in Design

In their 1928 winter magazine, the Fifth Avenue luxury department store B. Altman and Company describes evolving fashion trends as the “playful imagination of fashion [that] is constantly conceiving delightfully fanciful things, some of which live while others wither and die. How frivolous one can feel in billows of tulle and chiffon—in a youthful bouffant frock, . . . or, when dining and dancing in crowded spaces, how smart the sophisticate appears in an evening gown of more restraint—one that falls in straighter, softer lines and follows the body rather [definitively].” Altman’s observation aptly reflects the evolution of style during the 1920-30 decade.





The decade dawned with women’s voting rights and freedoms (leading to shorter dress hems) and ended with the cataclysmic crash of a booming economy (in which hem length dropped along with stocks). B. Altman’s statement marks the fashion-pendulum swing from the frilly garden party and elaborate and beaded flapper dresses (with hem lines reaching their height in 1927 to just below the knee), to the advancing trend towards more conservatively-styled, longer and sleeker gowns “of more restraint,” what Altman called the “straightening out’ feeling.” These dresses were typically made from velvet, heavy silk, silk crepe de Chine, silk pongee, lace, and the new Rayon, and they hug the body in ways that Jean Harlow would later make famous.
