Wow! What a time we had on the Dick and Jane Tour! Outstanding. See our full recap in this issue.



Notes from Our Director

For four months I have had a temporary handicapped parking pass. It was a Godsend for the first six weeks while tethered to a four posted wheeled walker. A few weeks after graduating to a cane my therapist encouraged me to walk for longer distance—beyond the handicapped parking spaces. Another month passed and I found myself wanting to park half-way across the large box stores paved lots. The exercise felt good.

Last week, while waiting my turn for a handicapped parking spot, being cramped and in pain, I nervously watched as a person not much older than me struggled to exit her car. She needed a full five minutes to manually lift and position her legs and winced the entire time she needed to get herself upright. Tentatively, as she struggled to walk, each step elicited a pained grimace. I turned to my wife and said, "There's somebody who needs this spot more than I. Let's keep it free."

In the early days of my arthritis pain my friend Judy, herself a long-time sufferer from joint and bone pain, while on the ballroom dance floor said to me, "Come on, Larry. Suck it up! Don't you know that there are people far worse off than you? People who can't walk and wish that they could? People who can't dance and wish that they could? You're not there yet. So don't let yourself think that you are!"

For a few months following my knee joint replacements I was an invalid confined to relearning the most basic of human functions—walking. My skeletal structure had been altered and all of my supporting ligature had been either severed and re-stitched or moved. Excruciating pain was ever-present. It was hard work.

Five months later, the pain is intermittent. There are good days and bad days. I still can't assume the contorted position of driving an A-Model Roadster but that ability will return and eventually I'll be able to tour again.

I'll be in the middle of the pack taking my rightful place and when we stop to eat—which will be often—don't look for me in one of the parking spots near the door. Come rain or sunshine I'll give up my spot for somebody whose physical condition warrants it. Besides, I'll need the exercise.

MARC NATIONAL "TOBACCO ROAD" TOUR

CARY, NORTH CAROLINA

Welcome Dinner beside Lake Montague

Southside A's members Ray and Teri Besch, Tom and Betty Miller, and Jim Wingo with friend Richard Kingman traveled over 1,200 total miles to MARC's 2014 National Tour, the North Carolina Tobacco Road from September 21st to 24th. The tour was based in Cary, N.C, one of the cities within the famed Triangle comprised of Raleigh, Durham and Chapel Hill. The tour was hosted by the TarWheel A's.

Tours were varied including: historical sites, fabulous Duke Gardens, amazing car collections, museums and even a drive-in movie.

The tour was kicked off with an excellent dinner of N.C. BBQ next to beautiful LakeMontague, over 100 Model A's gathered on Sunday evening to enjoy new and old friends with a common interest.

Several tours were enjoyed the first day including a visit to Atkinson's Mill, Tobacco Farm Life Museum, and Selma Antique hunting. Atkinson's Milling Company started operation in April 1757 and it is still producing high quality corn mill products today. The Tobacco Farm Life Museum in Kenly, N.C. preserving the history and cultural heritage of Eastern North Carolina farm life. North Carolina farmers have been growing



tobacco since the 1660's. A tour of Selma was also on tap with an excellent lunch, shopping antique

stores and visiting the oldest surviving train station in North Carolina that was built in 1855. The day was far from over as the group drove to the Raleigh Road Drive-In Theater, one of only four left in North Carolina, to enjoy the classic film "The Grapes of Wrath" starring Henry Fonda. An excellent film if only because of the many Model A's shown during the film.

The second day took the group to two privately owned car collections not generally open to the pubic in Franklinton and Zebulon, N.C. Bob Schaaf's collection included fine examples of low production, finned convertibles an woodies from the 1930's to 1962. The second collection, owned by Mike Leith was very diverse but focused primarily on cars from the 1930's thru 1960's, with "original unrestored" being the key criteria for the collection. The collection included three outstanding 1931 Model A's, a pickup, a Deluxe Coupe and a very nice Roadster.



The final day and Grand Tour took the group to Carthage, N.C. and the 100+ Years of Progress Collection, a private collection and unique collection of farm and earth moving machinery. traction engines and antique vehicles owned by the Eders' family. The collection boasts 1,000 machines on display.

The Tech Corner

King Pin Geometry!

There are many articles written about how to install new king pins in a Model A Ford. However, unless you fully understand the geometry of the Model A front end, there may be an element of doubt concerning whether you did the job correctly. Since I did not understand the front-end geometry, I turned to Les Andrews for a proper explanation. Most of what is written here about the front-end geometry is a paraphrase of Les's explanation.

The weight of the body and frame in the front is resting on the center of the front spring where it is U-bolted to the frame. This weight is transferred out to each end of the front spring where the shackles attach it to the front axle. Therefore all the front-end weight is sitting on the front axle. This full weight is transferred to the king pins. To test the theory, slip a king pin into one end of the axle, without the spindle installed, and install the locking bolt, the king pin is now an integral part of the axle. It is easy to see that the weight of the axle will now be applied to the bottom side of the king pin flange. The king pin is locked in place in the axle and does not rotate.

Directly under the king pin flange a thrust bearing will be installed. The weight will now be on the thrust bearing and it will sit on top of the top surface of the spindle when it is installed. When the wheel is on the car and it is sitting on the ground the front-end weight is pressing down on the thrust bearing and against the top surface of the spindle. The spindle will rotate on the thrust bearing around the stationary king pin.

One would think all you had to do was put the parts together and you're good to go. Unfortunately reproduction parts and 75 plus years of wear enter into the equation. The thrust bearings available today (Timken part number T-83) are not as thick as were the originals (Ford part number A-3123), therefore shims are required for proper fit. The repo dust cover retainers supplied today are incorrectly made and will interfere with the installation. Wear to the mating surfaces of the axle and spindles are also a factor. All these variables must be taken into consideration when installing new king pins.

When installing new king pins the first effort should be to determine how many shims are needed under the thrust bearing. To do this install the king pin, the thrust bearing, and the spindle. Leave the dust seal off. Lock the king pin to the axle with the locking nut and bolt. Rotate the spindle and see how freely it rotates. Note any up and down movement. You will probably have up and down movement so add one or two shims. Check it again. Add shims until the spindle seems to be binding and not turning freely. Remove a shim if that is the case.

The shims will take up the free space that is between the bottom of the thrust bearing and the spindle. This free space is created by the lack of proper thickness of the thrust bearing and any wear that has occurred on the mating surfaces of the axle and the spindle.

Bratton's Antique Auto claims to stock a repo metal dust cover that is made to the original Ford drawing. That may be the case, but it still may not fit properly due to wear to the axle or spindle surfaces. Les Andrews says to leave them out completely. If you are a purest you may not want to do that.

My advice is to go ahead and try to install them. If they interfere, remove them and grind the lip down a little bit.

When you think you have the proper amount of shims installed and you think the dust cover is not interfering, there is a way to test it. With the car still sitting on jack stands, place a floor jack under the end of the spindle near the threaded end and run the jack up to put pressure on spindle. This will simulate the wheel being installed and the car sitting on the ground. With your fingers try to rotate the thrust bearing. You should not be able to move it. Do the same with the dust cover; you should be able to rotate it.

Correct installation of king pins, along with correct adjustment of the front wheel bearings is essential to safe proper steering. ©

This collection has artifacts and displays outlining the history of the Airmen before and during World War II. We will continue on to **Tallassee** for lunch with a selection of four (4) restaurants for traditional, American, Mexican and Chinese your choice. After lunch we will continue our scenic tour to **Fort Toulouse National Park** containing Indian mounds, a French & American Fort, or you may want to visit the Wetumpka Antique Mall, the evening will be open. Saturday we're off to **Horseshoe Bend National Military Park** for a windshield tour and on site orientation at various locations of the battlefield. The Park was established to preserve and protect the site of the last major battle of the Creek Indian War (1813-1814). After the tour we will motor to the **Sherman Model "A" Ford garage complex** for our "All American" box lunch. After lunch we will visit the **Wellborn Muscle Car Museum**. It is truly an impressive collection of muscle cars and all sorts of MOPAR memorabilia and rare parts. The Gilmore is home to the Model A Ford Museum built by The Model A Ford Foundation (MAFFI) support from The Model A Restorers Club (MARC), The Model A Ford Club Of America (MAFCA), and many other individual Model A enthusiasts. This site was chosen because it is becoming a 'destination' for the antique automobile community.



The Gilmore Car Museum began in 1963 when Donald S. Gilmore's wife Genevieve gave him a 1920 Pierce Arrow for his birthday. Restoring that classic vehicle—which is still on display at the museum—ignited a passion. Over the years that followed, Donald continued buying and restoring great cars. To accommodate

He also purchased several historic barns, had them dismantled, and moved to the site—a stroke of inspiration that gives the museum its unique, rustic character. It was Genevieve who came up with the idea of turning the collection into a museum, which would allow future generations to enjoy the one-of-a-kind collection. The Gilmore's established a non-profit foundation and opened the museum to

collection — which soon grew to over 30 vehicles — he acquired 90 acres of farmland in southwest Michigan.

Most of the Marque museums depict a


