International Model A Day Tour – another nice outing for the books.






Lisa & Jeremy Klinger with their A, and a close-up of their fun hood ornament.

The (Not Necessarily Annual) Fun With Dick & Jane Tour

Over forty adventurous souls set out for a fun-filled and enjoyable weekend, taking part in another terrific Fun With Dick & Jane Tour. Our base was North Augusta just over the Georgia border into South Carolina.

Our first stop was the historic Augusta canal, with a fascinating history beginning in the 1840s. The Canal Museum is in a former textile mill, the Graniteville Company, and has really wonderful depictions of all the aspects of life in the area. The best part for me was getting a good education on how hydroelectric power is actually created. Electricity is still being produced thanks to the canal, and excess power is sold back to Georgia.

Next up was the August Cultural Center is housed in Sacred Heart Church, which held its first service in December, 1900. It closed its doors in 1971, and had a period of neglect. But in 1987, having already been placed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Knox Foundation formed an organization to maintain the building and develop it for cultural activities.

Meadow Garden was the home of George Walton, famous for being the youngest signer of the Declaration of Independence. Walton trained as a lawyer, served in the Continental Congress as well as the Georgia militia. Captured during the war, in 1778, he was eventually exchanged, going on to become Governor of Georgia, elected twice, and also served as the state's Chief Justice. The original home was rather modest, but was added onto over time; renovations still going on have revealed building techniques of the time, some of which will be left visible for a glimpse of how things were done during that era.

The last venue that first day was the August Museum of History. A different kind of experience ensued for several people, who discovered that a full-fledged railroad train traverses down the middle of the street used to get to the museum. Observed to be a "train without end," and after waiting some twenty minutes for a break to cross the street, the intrepid travelers returned to our host hotel. A good story was told by all.

Saturday took us toward Aiken, SC, to Redcliffe Plantation, dating from 1859. This was one of four plantations owned by James Henry Hammond. He was an attorney who, before the Civil War, served in the US House, was governor of South Carolina, and was a US senator. Hammond's great grandson, John

Shaw Billings, editor of Time, Life and Fortune magazines, inherited the property, maintained it, and then donated it to the South Carolina Park Service, who oversees it today.

On we went to the Aiken Train Depot, housing wonderful dioramas depicting the railroad travel in the area. This area benefitted from reliable train service, as wealthy businessmen from the northeast began wintering in Aiken, bringing their thoroughbred races horses and polo ponies with them. Aiken became a noted horse training center that also developed land for fox hunting and golf. A winter playground that still maintains its beauty and charm today.

Hopeland Gardens was one such property devoted to horse racing in Aiken, known at the time as the Horse Capital of the South. The natural beauty of the gardens, with their ancient oaks, and reflecting pools, were opened to the public by the owner, Mrs. Hope Iselin, in 1969.

The Dollhouse, used today for children’s and garden club activities, was ordered by Mrs. Iselin from the Sears & Roebuck catalog in the early 1900s, and it still stands today.

Our final destination was the Aiken County Historical Museum housed in one of the “Winter Colony” cottages. It’s actually to houses that were eventually connected, creating a rambling home that features 32 rooms, 15 bathrooms and a full size ballroom. Some of its treasures include a model big-top circus, drugstore soda fountain, a fire engine, and period furnishings and impressive artwork. We were also

greeted by General Wade Hampton (Eddie Rodgers), who made his mark at the Battle of Aiken, the last battle of the Civil War in the South. Using his own money, he formed his own legion to protect the city, successfully preserving it for the inhabitants and those who now come to appreciate its beauty. Mr. Rodgers, a Civil War reenactor, plays the Confederate general in the 2021 movie, "Hampton's Legion," available on YouTube, and shares the story with visitors to the Museum.

Take a Little Trip

Traveling in a Model A is one of the highlights of our hobby. Combining an interest in Model As, travel, and era fashion is about the best thing I can think of to experience all aspects of this hobby. Where are you going? Is it for the weekend? What's the weather forecast? A few things to ask yourself before beginning to plan your wardrobe and luggage requirements.

"Each year motoring becomes more and more a favorite pastime as weekends grow in popularity..." according to the June 1931 issue of *Good Housekeeping*. This sentiment is very similar to the short tours so many of our chapters take each year. Do you and a few Model A friends like to take day trips and pack a lunch? Have a little fun with it! One of my favorite trips involved the Southeastern Touring group and a trip onto the Blue Ridge Parkway. My husband and I packed a lunch and brought our picnic set along. Add some fried chicken, potato salad, and lemonade for a trip you won't soon forget. (Figure 1) These luncheon kits were suggested for anyone "motoring much". They are not the easiest to find at antique stores, but I have seen several in my travels. It may look like a suitcase if it is setting on the floor closed. Look a little closer and you may find a treasure.

"Talon Hookless Fasteners," "slide fasteners" or "Zip-O-Grips" were all names for what we would call a zipper. These started showing up in luggage before the Model A era. Here is an ad from July 1927 in the *York (PA) Daily Record*. (Figure 2) The same ad, two months earlier, from Austin, TX did not mention the "new zippered cases" noted in the "For Long Trips" section.

Of other interest is the mention on short trips using "light luggage for feminine travelers". Not only were motoring trips becoming commonplace, the ads were focusing on females and the needs of traveling with multiple dresses, shoes, and hats.


"Brimmed hats having returned to fashion importance, a large hat box is required, as proved Mendel-Drucker model, covered in Scotch tweed Also shown, is the Oshkosh duffle bag of orange striped cord duck which is great for shoes. In the hand, you see a Zip-O-Grip handbag made of colored goat skin. At her feet is the Revelation

The Seward Aero-wardrobe conveniences. Hanging over the Seward is a Snuggle Rug of plaid woolen, which, on motor trips, is a "wise precaution". This rug is bag and uses a Talon Hookless Fastener. (Figure 3)

Next time you travel in your Model A, think about your luggage and for the era. Many of these suitcases, duffles, and trunks can be found on in antique stores, for a decent price. Even if you only use it as a prop in your "A," or for your next trip down the runway at a fashion judging event, you'll be adding a little more authenticity to the occasion.




The Tech Corner

Exercise Mats for Comfort

I picked up a set of 6 foam exercise mats, about 1/2" thick and 2 feet square, at a yard sale a few months ago. I think I paid about \$5 for them. They have interlocking edges that allow you to join them to make larger mats.

These things have proven to be wonderful to sit on or kneel on, any time I need to work on something low on the car. I will join 2 or 3 of them and lay under the car on them. They are also very comfortable to stand on in front of a work bench.

I have seen these mats sold in a set of 6 on Amazon and similar places for about \$25. They are also sold in 3/4" and 1" thicknesses. If you can't find them easily near you at a yard sale, that is another option. Either way, they are well worth having on hand.

Here's a bit of history...

Hours after Pearl Harbor was bombed on December 7, 1941, the Secret Service found themselves in a bind. President Franklin D. Roosevelt was to give his Day of Infamy speech to Congress on Monday, and although the trip from the White House to Capitol Hill was short, agents weren't sure how to transport him safely.

At the time, Federal Law prohibited buying any cars that cost more than \$750, so they would have to get clearance from Congress to do that, and nobody had time for that. One of the Secret Service members, however, discovered that the US Treasury had seized the bulletproof car that mobster Al Capone owned when he was sent to jail in 1931. They cleaned it, made sure it was running perfectly and had it ready for the President the next day.

Al Capone's 1928 Cadillac V-8 Town Sedan became the President's Limo in December, 1941.

Mechanics are said to have cleaned and checked each feature of the Caddy well into the night of December 7th, to make sure that it would run properly the next day for the Commander in Chief. And run properly it did. It had been painted black and green to look identical to Chicago's police cars at the time. To top it off, the gangster's 1928 Cadillac Town Sedan had 3,000 pounds of armor and inch-thick bulletproof windows. It also had a specially installed siren and flashing lights hidden behind the grille, along with a police scanner radio.

Footnote: The car sold at auction in 2012 for \$341,000.00.
